Brian Butt and I left the Glacier Creek access road at 1:00pm on Friday afternoon after a mandatory Starbucks loiter session. The access road is a windy 13km climb to the Heliotrope Ridge parking lot and we were fortunate to be able to drive 10km. We spent the better part of two hours skinning in and out of trees before the trail opened up to huge snow covered moraines. We made camp at the toe of the Coleman Glacier, having climbed about 1275m/4180ft, and enjoyed a dehydrated meal of who knows what.

At 4:30am, we were awoken by the sound of crampons on the icy snow as a climbing party passed our tent. After breakfast and a debate on the mediocre weather, we set off at 6:30am. The col between Baker and Colfax peak was relatively simple to find as we weaved our way up the glacier. Due to the relatively large snowfall Baker received this year, we collectively decided to travel unroped as all but the largest crevasses were filled. Once at the col the skis were buried, we put on crampons and started up the ridge and ramp, leading to the summit. The headwall is about 300m/1000ft up and although 30 degrees at bottom and 45-50 degrees at the top, the exposure is enough (as Andrea put it) to get your attention. Once on summit plateau (3280m/10,758ft) at 10:30am, the wind blew so hard I could barely enjoy my frozen Powerbar. The decent was, although easier, not the most enjoyable ski I've ever had as it ranged from ice to slush. At 6:00pm, we were eating Mexican food and having a much deserved beer in Sumas. All in all a great climb with great partners.

Saturday March 3rd to Saturday March 10th, 2007.

LOCATION

The chalet is situated at tree level at 6850 feet, near the towering peaks of the Freshfield Range, north of Golden, BC, near the Continental Divide, on the snowy west side of the Rocky Mountains.
